

Pentecost Resources for Christian Education

May 15, 2016 is Pentecost Sunday, when we celebrate the birth of the church. Who doesn't like a birthday party? So why not have a birthday party for the church, complete with cake, party decorations, and gifts? Your gifts can be items collected for a shelter, children's ward of a hospital, or other suitable charitable organization. Here are some more ideas for celebrating with children, youth, and adults.



Make it colorful

The color for Pentecost is red, representing the tongues of flame that symbolized the Holy Spirit in Acts 2. Encourage everyone to dress in red and have red, orange, and yellow streamers and other decorations.

Make it dramatic

Let children dress up and act out the story of Pentecost as someone reads the account in Acts 2. Props can be paper flames that the children hold over their heads as they make the sound of the wind.

Make it symbolic

Pentecost is rich in symbols. There are plenty of crafts which illustrate **fire** and the tongues of flame which appeared over Jesus' followers. You can find them on [Pinterest](#) along with other Pentecost crafts for kids. To emphasize that the Holy Spirit was like a fierce **wind**, make pinwheels. The [Stories on the Way website](#) include a lesson with instructions and a template for pinwheels. The **dove** is another symbol for the Holy Spirit. There are plenty of craft ideas online to make paper or fabric doves. This [website](#) shows how to make a dove out of a paper plate.

Make it intergenerational
