Strategies for Success

- What can you do to maximize your strengths as a small congregation?
- How can you address obstacles to ministry?

Ideas/Case Studies

- Catalyst for development of homeless shelter in smaller community
- Priest at two small Episcopal parishes took the lead in convening people to talk about new site for a shelter in the community
- Group of church members/community members formed a separate nonprofit for the shelter

Ideas/Case Studies

- Community garden using church green space
- People interested in/gifted in gardening in the congregation
- Donated seeds and use of equipment via Extension Service
- Work with block clubs and Neighborhood Association to recruit volunteers and to promote the project
- Good signage, encouraging neighbors to stop by and "grab something for supper"

Ideas/Case Study

- Provide studio space to several community artists
- Provide small commissions for pieces for the church, used during church holidays
- Work with schools and youth development orgs. in the community to secure grants for artist residencies
- Art classes for the broader community offered at the church—youth and adult-focused

Ideas/Case Studies

- Join a coalition working on an important community issue
- Now: Covid-19 task force. Or: Affordable Housing Coalition, Mental Health
- Listen first, find ways for your church to provide a meaningful contribution to the group. Host events, provide a place for training, provide volunteers
- Bonus: You receive up-to-date informationk



Create a Culture of "Yes"



Ways to encourage idea-sharing

- Annual all-congregation visioning/planning meeting
- Add it into the work of committees each year
- Do study and sharing new ministry ideas in small groups
- Preaching series that encourages people to bring forward new ideas

Be Bold in Asking for Resources

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Ask for Money

- Identify "giving packages"—items or projects with a price tag (camp scholarships or buy a piece of equipment, for example).
- Utilize contacts of the people in your church
- Put together a one-page description of your project that makes the case for it.










Don't over-structure or overcommittee your church

 Too many committees take people away from hands-on ministry

Consider having just three committees

- Administrative/Management
 - Finance, property, Human Resources
- Spiritual Development/Discipleship
 - Internal church ministries—youth/children, adult education, spiritual formation
- Outreach
 - Community partnerships, event, programs
