However, what stands in their way is the pharaoh, plagues, and a harsh, unforgiving landscape. While they would experience loss and disruption in the journey, God worked on a new plan for their betterment. Reflect on the story. In what ways did God disrupt Moses and the Israelites' lives for the better? How has our current reality, through the pandemic, been disrupted for good? Was it easy or difficult to see the blessings in disguise?

Embrace Spirituality as the Next Normal

Thinking Deeper (10 minutes)

The pandemic may have disrupted your church attendance, but it has also created opportunities for
spirituality to grow. Twelve-step groups such as Alcoholics Anonymous are increasing in popularity.
People find that they need to develop a deeper spiritual connection to recover from addiction. At the
same time, church attendance continues to decrease. What learnings do you gain from the ideas being
presented in this chapter?

Reflecting on Scripture (30 minutes)

Read Luke 24:13-35. In this passage, we are told of disciples upset about the death of Jesus. But after their transformative experience with Jesus in teaching, journeying, and communion, they are revitalized. This experience is not just an emotional high but a life-changing event that propels them to go out and share the good news. For them, it will be a spiritual experience that they reflect on for years. What spiritual experiences have you had in your life that have been similarly transformational? How did they change your perspective or behavior?

Personal Reflection (5 minutes)

Spiritual experience is a formative part of discipleship. What is one spiritual experience

In this chapter, Rebekah writes about the value of faith development and about how this development is happening in ways that do not necessarily conform to current church models. Rebekah states, "Spirituality is learning and experiencing how important you are to God, how you are made in God's image, and how God created you for community with God and with others." How does your community invite people to experience God in their lives? Not just through traditional religious means but also through a spiritual presence that is felt daily. List three tangible ways you might live more fully into a deeper spirituality.

Read Genesis 6:9-22. In this passage, we find the story of Noah and the Ark. God tells Noah to build an ark because a flood is coming. You can imagine how Noah might have felt when there wasn't even a cloud in the sky. Building the ark represented a massive investment in technology that didn't make sense at the time, even to a faithful man like Noah. In what ways does this story speak to our current need for adaptation in the area of technology? What areas of technology might your church community implement to participate more fully in an unexpected future?

Personal Reflection (5 minutes)


During the early days of the pandemic, fear was a predominant feeling. In what ways can you counteract fear by spreading hope, love, and joy in a post-pandemic world?
